The Musée Marmottan houses more than 100 works by Claude Monet, including the painting famous that gave Impressionism its name. The museum also displays part of the private art collection of this master artist. It is located in a park close to the Eiffel Tower → p. 56

Discover new places and save money

Atmospheric organ concerts

A number of churches regularly offer free concerts. The rich sound of organ music resonating through the arches of *Notre-Dame Cathedral* is more than impressive — both visually and acoustically \rightarrow p. 33

Free couscous

The *Le Tribal-Café* as well as a dozen or so other restaurants provide a free meal on weekends. However, guests are expected to pay a small amount for a beverage. The atmosphere is convivial, as though you were dining with friends \rightarrow p. 68

Free museum admission

Hard to believe, but true: many museums in Paris do not charge admission. One of the most highly recommended is the *Musée d'Art Moderne de la Ville de Paris* \rightarrow **p.** 31

Free attractions with a view

For the best view of the city without paying admission for the Eiffel Tower or the Tour Montparnasse climb the stairs of *Sacré-Cœur*. Performances by jugglers and musicians at no extra cost → p. 57

Paris on inline skates

Every Friday evening, nearly 20 miles of the city are closed off for avid Rollerbladers. Inline skating through Paris is one of the most enjoyable ways of getting to know Paris – if only a small part. The fun begins at 10pm at Montparnasse station (photo)

Live chansons at no charge

Even the more modest restaurants frequently provide diners with the opportunity to listen to classic French songs after a good meal — live. Restaurants such as *Le Limonaire* are particularly atmospheric \rightarrow p. 88

Unique experiences

Gourmet mecca

Nowhere else in the world have so many stars graced both chefs and restaurants as in Paris. Yet the *brasseries* such as *Bofinger* are still the gastronomic heart of the city, offering the best quality plus an amazing ambiance \rightarrow p. 62

Arcades – Nostalgie à la française

Paris is defined by the splendour of its past. Upscale covered shopping centres such as the *Galerie Vivienne* (photo) have existed since the 18th century and are typical of parts of the city even today → p. 42

Inner city market with multicultural flair

Chinese, Indians and Africans from every part of the continent have all injected culture and an exotic flair into certain districts. The African market, Marché Barbès, is a tantalising example \rightarrow p. 81

Luxurious shopping

Paris, as the epitome of luxury, is celebrated for its champagne, perfume and fashion. You can find a large selection of luxury items within the "Triangle d'Or" – the golden triangle around the *rue du Faubourg Saint-Honoré* → p. 78

Museums of international renown

Alongside the Louvre – the museum with the largest exhibition space in the world – the Centre Pompidou boasts the largest collection of modern art in Europe today. The museum that best reflects Paris, however, is the *Musée d'Orsay*, with its collection of works by the French Impressionists \rightarrow p. 39

Street cafés

Street cafés act as an extension of a Parisian living room. Even the tiniest space on the pavement has enough room for a couple of tables and chairs. The café terrace at the *Café Marly* at the Louvre is ideal for people-watching \rightarrow p. 66

Exhibition of the city's history

There are few cities in Europe that can look back on such a tumultuous 2,000 year history. The *Musée Carnavalet* displays a profound and inspiring insight into the city's past \rightarrow p. 47

Bouillon Racine ahead! The nearest Métro stations to the last stop on the tour on rue de la Huche are M 4 Saint-Michel or Cité.

If you want to get behind the scenes to explore their unique charm and head off the beaten track or find your way to green oases, handpicked restaurants or the best local activities, then these tailored Discovery Tours are just the right thing. With a diameter of approx. 5 km (3.1 miles), the core of the city is smaller than one might expect. You can get a good feel for the metropolis on the water, but the view from the Arc de Triomphe will also help you get your bearings. No visit to Paris would be complete without a stop at the Eiffel Tower and the Louvre, but some of the best art awaits at the Musée d'Orsay. A meal in an Art Nouveau-style restaurant followed by a walk through the lighted streets of Paris cap off the experience.
