INSIDER TIP Holiday on the farm



An early start to the day with yoga

From 6–8am, at 26 different public spaces in Chennai, e.g. Panagal Park and Marina Beach, you can take part in *free yoga classes*. The idea came from the former mayor, who had the good health of the citizenry at heart \rightarrow p. 123

Massage included

In the spice gardens of Goa, tours also include free, relaxing *massages*. Of course, there is the ulterior motive that you'll later purchase the requisite oils, but you don't have to \rightarrow p. 43

Silent Parties

Dancing at night, barefoot on the sand, with headphones on – that's both romantic and considerate. And it's easy on the wallet: the *open air discos in Palolem* in Goa offer free entry (photo) \Rightarrow p. 39

• First the rice harvest, then the entertainment

Once the rice has been gathered in, the farmers around Hampi organise *ox-cart races* and *bullfights*. The animals don't suffer, the Torero's prize being the money and sweets that he manages to pluck from the head of the bull. And you can also take part and enjoy South Indian traditions up close \rightarrow p. 83

End the day with fresh shrimps

Buy some freshly caught shrimps straight from the Chinese fishing nets in Kochi and have them prepared at the stall. They'll cost you a pound at most and you'll sit on the sand with the bag in your hand and watch as the giant nets are silhouetted against the sunset − just stunning → p. 50

More than 300 concerts for free

At the Chennai Music and Dance Festival, classical music and traditional dances are performed at more than 100 venues, with over 2000 participants contributing to at least 300 concerts. And it doesn't cost a thing, though small donations are, of course, always welcome → p. 127

When Indian men go dancing

Kathakali, the best-known dance drama in South India, is noted for the colourful make-up and elaborate costumes of the male-only performers. You are welcome to watch the painstaking make-up process, and of course the dances themselves, which recreate scenes from ancient Hindu epics → p. 53

Temporary tattoo

In the model village of *Dakshinachitra* near Chennai, you can see demonstrations of typical Indian handicrafts. While you're there, you can also have elaborate henna mehndi patterns painted on your hands → p. 102



Pondicherry is a real shopper's paradise when it comes to basic spiritual requirements. This is mainly due to the *Sri Aurobindo shops*, which sell clothes, bags, jewellery, incense sticks, oils and high quality handmade paper, all made in the nearby ashram at Auroville \rightarrow p. 104

India's treasures lie in the south


The vast majority of the subcontinent's most impressive monuments and cultural treasures are located in South India. Look out for the stunning *temple complex of Hampi* (photo) and the magical *sea temple in Mamallapuram* \rightarrow **p. 80, 103**

Riding pillion through Goa

When in Goa you can hire a motorbike rider who will take you everywhere on the back of his bike or Vespa. It's inexpensive, fun and an unusual way to get around. You can find *two-wheeler taxi stands* everywhere \rightarrow p. 41

• Farewell on the beach

These *ceremonies* may make you feel uneasy, but will show you a real piece of India. You have to get up early though to watch the priests at work on *Varkala beach* in Kerala. Families arrive with the ashes of their recently departed, so they can be blessed and then scattered in the sea \rightarrow p. 68

THE PERFECT ROUTE

Experience the many sides of South India, from Tamil Nadu to the beaches of Goa via tiger reserves, the Backwaters and city pubs

TEMPLE, TEMPLE, TEMPLE

1 Chennai → p. 96 is the perfect starting point. Here you can hire a car with driver for the entire journey, or arrange to cover some sections by train. Before setting off from Chennai, climb the 106 steps to the white San Thome Basilica, where tradition states that St Thomas the Apostle met his martyrdom. The East Coast Road follows the sea south to 2 Mamallapuram → p. 103 (photo left). At this unique Unesco

World Heritage Site allow yourself plenty of time to admire the *sea temples* and the nine *cave temples* with reliefs full of elephants and celestial beings. The journey continues southwards to ③ *Thanjavur* → p. 108, which has all of 90 temples. You can enjoy a superb view over ④ *Tiruchirappalli* → p. 109 from the 83-m (272-ft) high *Rock Fort* crowned by the *Ucchi Pillar Temple*. Just 6km (4mi) away, the legendary temple city of ⑤ *Srirangam* → p. 110 lies on an island between two rivers, its bazaars thronging with pilgrims. South India's greatest marvel, however, is in ⑥ *Madurai* → p. 105 — the *Sri Meenakshi Sundareshwarar Temple*, festooned with some 33 million figures of gods and demons. Before the visit you can order a garment from one of the 250 tailors in the adjacent

bazaar, and pick it up afterwards.

Now it's up into the hills with their tea gardens and into the
? Periyar National Park → p. 58 (photo right). Whether you're on a boat trip, trekking or bamboo rafting, elephants and monkeys will be likely to cross your path and, with a bit of luck, even a tiger. Afterwards you can go to the beach, namely the one at ③ Varkala → p. 68. Climb the steps to the top of the red cliffs, and enjoy the views from one of the many open-air cafés, bars or restaurants. Even if it's only for a few hours, in ④ Alappuzha → p. 55, the Venice of the East, you should board a houseboat made of bamboo and coconut and take a relaxing journey along the enchanted Backwaters. In ⑩ Kochi → p. 49 immerse yourself in the bustle of the Old Town's narrow alleyways; at sunset take a boat trip to photograph the Chinese fishing nets.

PARTIES, SHOPPING, ANCIENT SPLENDOUR

1) Mysore → p. 91 is the fairytale city of the Maharajas. During festivals the magnificent palace of Amba Vilas is illuminated by 96,000 light

bulbs. On then to the shopper's paradise of ② Bangalore → p. 76: silk, saris, jewellery and rugs — along the MG Road there is one fantastic shop after another. This western-influenced city with its plentiful nightlife is also often called the Pub City.

EROTICA IN STONE

Quite a sight. The erotic depictions at the Hoysala Temple in 13 Belur → p. 89 are extremely detailed. An almost mystical scene unfolds at 14 Hampi → p. 80. The location alone, between granite rocks and the river, is stunning. Hire a bicycle to explore the extensive complex — also a Unesco World Heritage Site — with its temples, palaces and the famous Stone Chariot. Four cave temples are hidden among the red sandstone hills of 15 Badami → p. 85. In the first one you can take lessons from the 18-armed statue of Nataraja (Shiva), who demonstrates 81 different dance moves.

SWIMMING, PARTYING, RIVER TRIP UNDER THE STARS

Now you can relax on the endless beaches of Goa. This, the smallest Indian state, is strongly influenced by its Portuguese heritage and exudes joje de vivre. The Queen

of the sands is considered to be **1** Calangute Beach → p. 35. But you should also definitely visit **1** Old Goa (Velha Goa) → p. 43, with its snow-white church Basilica Bom Jesus. And finally, at sunset treat yourself to a romantic boat trip on the Mandovi River in the capital of Goa, **1** Panaji → p. 40. Return to Chennai from Dambolim airport.
